A Letter from our Team Vicar



"Every cloud has a silver lining," is one of those statements which may hit the right tone but might come across as trite or even insensitive. If you are going through tough times, you may be tempted to poke the eye or biff the nose of anyone telling you that every cloud has a silver lining.

I am not going to say that, but at risk of facial injury, I do want to offer you the picture of a rainbow. Silver-lined clouds and rainbows both

need clouds and sunshine, but the silver-lined clouds still hide the sun whereas the rainbow appears when the sun and the clouds are both in view.

The other important difference from my point of view is that the rainbow is a biblical image (I cannot think of anywhere in the Bible that mentions clouds with silver linings, but if you know different, please let me know). The rainbow is borrowed by many people and organisations, but in the first book of the Bible God puts a rainbow in the sky for Noah and his family when they come out of the ark after the flood.

I always think it is such an appropriate sign for those who have just been through the flood. The flood in Genesis is a picture of creation itself being put into reverse. It stands as a symbol for everything we know being destroyed or taken away or turned upside down. And if you have been through a flood, the thing most likely to raise your fears is the appearance of dark clouds. God tells Noah that the rainbow will serve as a sign that the total destruction will not be repeated.

We all know from primary school science that the recipe for a rainbow is rain and sunlight. The rainbow appears when the sunlight shines into the very thing that threatens us and makes us afraid.

At Easter Christians celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. On the cross Jesus was destroyed—he was killed. The gospel writers tell us that darkness covered the sky on that "Good" Friday. But having been buried, he rose again, full of new life, like a shaft of sunlight bursting out of that empty tomb.

Jesus' resurrection has not instantly taken away all the dark clouds in the world; but if there are dark clouds in your life, I hope that you will let the light of the resurrection shine into those clouds and see a beautiful sign of hope and new life appear.

My brother Andrew found him - right down by the Dead Sea. He came home to Bethsaida so excited, "The Messiah has come, I've seen him. Come and see". And then he disappeared - this Messiah - into the mountains near Jericho. Gone, just like that. Just like Moses of old. We wondered if we'd ever see him again.

We did, of course, 40 days later - and we had a roller-coaster of three years! Highs and lows; seeing amazing things happen but sometimes not understanding what he was talking about.

When he was arrested, we ran; scared out of our wits! When he was killed, we thought it was all over: the dream, that he would save us from the Roman occupation. But death is death, we knew we'd never see him again.

And now? Well, three days on, he came back to life! I know it's hard to believe but he did. We weren't the only ones who saw him. On one occasion he appeared to 500 or more people.

He was with us for 40 precious days. We learnt so much from him in that time. And now he's gone. Just like that!

We were with him at Bethany on the eastern slopes of the Mount of Olives. He was talking to us, giving us God's blessing and then he just ... went. We saw him go - upwards towards the heavens.

Will we ever see him again? We have no doubt about that.

These were his words:

"In My Father's house are many mansions; if not, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself; that where I am, you may be also."

St Michael's Mission Partners: The Mothers' Union

Like TheO6, described in the last issue of The Messenger, The Mothers' Union is one of St Michael's Church's Mission Partners.

The Mothers' Union, a worldwide Anglican women's organisation, was founded by Mary Sumner (born December 1828). In 1876, when her eldest daughter Margaret gave birth, Mary was reminded how difficult she had found the burden of motherhood. The wife of a vicar, she decided to start a support group in her home. Unusually for the time, this was inclusive of all women regardless of their background or social status. Mary was so nervous at the first meeting that her husband had to host the meeting for her. By the second meeting she had gained enough confidence to host the group. From there the Mothers' Union movement gained momentum.

When Mary died on 11 August 1921, at the age of 92, over 4000 women

attended her funeral.

The Mothers' Union is an international Christian charity that seeks to support families worldwide. Its members are not all mothers or even all women, as there are many men, widows, singles and grandparents involved in its work.

Present in 84 countries with over 4 million members, Mothers' Union provides a network through which members can serve Christ in their own community. This is done through prayer, financial support and actively working at the grassroots level in programmes that meet local needs. Membership in the UK is approximately 93,000, which has slipped from 220,000 in 1993, a small percentage of the worldwide membership. However, most of those members worldwide rely on the financial contributions of the UK members.

Sadly, branches in our area of the diocese have closed and remaining members have joined Ottery, which is still a thriving branch with a good membership. Membership at £34 for the year is less than the price of a cup of coffee every month - a small sacrifice.

As a Christian membership charity, we demonstrate our faith in action. This happens as we work towards stopping poverty, stopping inequality and stopping injustice. Our members work at grassroots level around the world by delivering money, goods and skills rather than sending money through a hierarchy. They bring hope and practical support to millions of people every year through parenting, literacy and community development programmes to empower and serve those living in difficult conditions.

Councillor's Column



Potters/Morrisons planning application

I have submitted a detailed objection to this highly controversial planning application. My objection can be viewed both on EDDC's planning portal (ref 24/0044) and on my Councillor Facebook page. I'm monitoring the application to see how it progresses. Rest assured that I will do everything possible as the ward member to try to prevent this harmful planning application being approved.

The green wedge between West Hill and Ottery St Mary

The area between West Hill and Ottery St Mary is currently designated as a 'green wedge' in the joint West Hill and Ottery St Mary neighbourhood plan. This designation helps protect it as open countryside. At the Strategic Planning Committee in February, EDDC officers suggested that the vast majority of the green wedges across the district should lose their designations (including the one between West Hill and Ottery St Mary).

I strongly opposed the scrapping of the green wedges as did many other councillors and we voted the proposal down.

West Hill boundary

In February, I organised a meeting between myself, Parish Council representatives, the Head of Planning at EDDC and the Leader of EDDC to discuss the West Hill settlement boundary. Both myself and the Parish Council had objected to the revised boundaries in the draft local plan, which are much wider than is currently the case. The implications of this boundary widening would allow more housebuilding on the edge of West Hill. The purpose of the meeting was to highlight our continuing concerns. We need to see how EDDC planners respond.

South West Water - discharges into the River Otter

I continue to press South West Water to disclose real time data of their sewage discharges into the River Otter. Unlike other companies who disclose this information in real time on their websites, South West Water choose not to do so because it is not currently a statutory requirement. At a recent debate, I called for EDDC to urgently request the introduction of this information. I also called for Susan Davy, the CEO of South West Water, to waive all her future bonuses until there has been a substantial improvement in South West Water's environmental performance. Whilst EDDC agreed with my proposals, the difficulty is the flawed nature of the commercial water industry. This means that EDDC as an authority cannot compel South West Water to do anything at all.

Hospiscare News

Hospiscare is your local independent hospice charity looking after adults across Exeter, Mid and East Devon. Our community services are free and our 12-bed ward at Searle House offers 24-hour specialist care for people needing symptom control and end of life care 365 days of the year.

Local People deserve fair hospice funding

For over 40 years, Hospiscare has provided specialist end-of-life care. But now – we are facing a £2.5 million funding gap. The hospice costs almost £10 million a year to run. We have to raise 82% of that amount through charitable fundraising, with the Devon Integrated Care Board (ICB), the local organisation that allocates government healthcare funding, providing just 18%. This is below the national average of 37% that other hospices receive.

Andrew Randall, Chief Executive of Hospiscare, explains:

"Residents in our area deserve the very best care at the end of their lives and it's not right that existing services should be cut. We've had frank discussions over the last 12 months with the Devon ICB about increasing our funding fairly in line with other hospices but, so far, they have refused to increase our funding in line with the national average. Unless the local funding body increases our funding in line with other hospice providers, we'll sadly be forced into reducing our services."

<u>Please</u> we urge you to write to Dr Sarah Wollaston and Bill Shields, Chair and CEO of the ICB, to ask them to fund Hospiscare fairly so we can continue to provide outstanding-rated care. The Birds of West Hill

By April the breeding season will be well under way for many birds. Hormones linked to the increasing length of day trigger off changes in behaviour and anatomy for males and females. Courtship behaviour, especially in species that don't sing, includes mutual preening, feeding, flight displays and even dancing and aerobatic displays! By now singing males will be in full voice and both sexes have restored functioning reproductive organs (having been inactive since the previous summer). Females are attracted to males by the strength and complexity of their song (or other courtship behaviour) along with a striking plumage. The latter indicates a good diet and an ability to provision food for a family. At this stage the female needs convincing that the male she selects can defend its territory, that he can source sufficient food in his patch to feed a very hungry and fast-growing family, plus feed a female that might be left to look after the young. The territory also needs to include suitable sites for nesting, as most birds have specific requirements for a nesting site. In some species (like the Wren) courtship includes the male building several nests and the female choosing the nest.

After selecting a mate, the male and female often form a strong pair bond, enabling them to work cooperatively in rearing a family (it's hard work raising children!!). In some birds, like the Mute Swan and Bullfinch, this social monogamy lasts for a lifetime but for many species it lasts just for the breeding season. However, this bonding does not extend to sexual monogamy. The eggs in most clutches will have been fertilised by more than one male, ensuring any defective genes do not dominate and weaken the species. We can't impose our moral values of fidelity onto animals. Whilst we promise in the marriage ceremony to "... love him / her ... forsaking all others be faithful ... as long as you both shall live." That's not how it works with animals.

Monday Afternoon Bible Study (MABS)



We are currently part way through a course on Prayer. Called "Real Prayer", it has led us to consider why we pray, the privilege of prayer, how not to pray, and more. It has directed us to think in detail about the pattern of prayer that Jesus gave his first disciples when they asked "Lord, teach us to pray". We know his answer as The Lord's Prayer. It begins with acknowledging God's glory before we present our needs, ("give us......forgive us......protect us ") and it ends by returning to God, his kingdom, power and glory.

When we began the course, many of us admitted that our prayer focus was largely on petition (asking for) and thanksgiving. With three sessions to complete, some have already re-evaluated the time that they spend in prayer. One has spoken of the value of "talking together about how we approach God"; another admits to previously "never thinking of thanking God for his mercy, or praising his glory"; and another, of the course opening up aspects of prayer and "how to live daily closer to God."

This last comment reminded me of words of George Carey, one-time Archbishop of Canterbury, who wrote: "Most of us are mere novices when it comes to prayer. We paddle in the shallows of a relationship with God, when he longs for us to enter into the depths of a vibrant and rich prayer fellowship with him. For that to happen, we need to spend time in his presence ... just resting, contemplating, questioning, seeking — and finding" as we "join him in the spiritual battle against all that opposes his will".

By the time this edition of the Messenger is distributed we hope the weather will be showing the first signs of spring following a very dreary, wet winter.

We have a busy schedule of major events and marquee bookings throughout the year. These currently include:

2nd May - Police and Crime Commissioner Election.

29th June - West Hill Village Fete.

19th Nov - OSM Flower Arranging Christmas Display with staging.

23rd Nov - PTFA Ball with marquee.

30th Nov - Hospiscare Christmas Fayre.

At our recent Planning Group meeting we considered potential improvements to the Village Hall this year, within our spending constraints. We will look at improving our lighting system with the introduction of more LEDs throughout. The floor covering in Acorn room needs to be replaced and an upgrade to the sink unit is required. We will undertake some redecoration in various areas of the hall. All boundary hedges will be cut but this will not take place until the end of the bird nesting season.

We are pleased we finally have had our new defibrillator fitted. This was ordered from South West Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust on 12th April 2023. We anticipated installation by the end of the summer. Unfortunately, there was a worldwide shortage of defibrillators and the delay was extended when the manufacturer of the external casings ceased production. This meant SWASFT had to find a new provider. Fortunately, we received our unit, which was installed in February. The defibrillator has been registered on 'The Circuit', so it will be identified for anyone searching for the nearest defibrillator online. We will now organise training with SWASFT and are in touch with WHPC to see if we can co-ordinate this training with the Parish Council's free annual training session. West Hill is fortunate to have 3 identical units sited in Eastfield, at the RBL and now at WHVH.

We post the Minutes of our Management Group meetings and our Policy documents on the notice board at the village hall for the public to read. In recent months, some of these documents have been removed from the hall. This is an offence and discourteous to those members of public who wish to be informed about what is going on at the hall. We respectfully request that in future whoever is responsible reads the documents at the hall.

West Hill Parish Council (WHPC)

It has been a busy time for the Parish Council. A newsletter was delivered to residents in early February detailing all the major planning applications in or near West Hill.

One major planning application was not on the list because it arrived too late to be included: 24/0044/FUL at Potters Country Market. This is the site of the village shop and car park, currently being run as a Morrisons Daily convenience store and Post Office. The application was submitted by the owner of the site – a property company based in Manchester – not by Morrisons.

The Parish Council held an Extraordinary Meeting on Thursday 22nd February to allow residents an opportunity to share their views with Councillors before they voted on their response. At the meeting, large-scale drawings of the site plan and elevations were displayed, and leaflets were

provided to ensure residents knew how to submit their comments online, by email or by post to East Devon District Council. Some residents had also organised a petition. Over 150 residents came along. Two representatives from Avalon Planning & Heritage attended, as well as two representatives from Morrisons regional management team, and Ward Member Cllr Jess Bailey. In the audience was East Devon MP Simon Jupp.

The public session, extended by the Chairman to accommodate the many speakers, lasted an hour and was a lively and spirited session throughout. It was very clear that the public were unanimous in their strong opposition to the proposed scheme.

WHPC Councillors voted unanimously to strongly object to the proposal at Potters. Thank you to everyone who took the time to send comments to EDDC, representing views from neighbouring Aylesbeare and Ottery as well as West Hill.

Residents may be interested to know that the planning application for Roadside Services at Daisymount (21/1688/MFUL Land south of Lily Cottage) was approved. The Parish Council had objected, so this decision is very disappointing. It is hard to understand why anyone thinks there is a need for services at this location, given the proximity of the Moto services at J30 of the M5 and at Honiton, as well as all the facilities at Whimple and Ottery.

Housing land supply in East Devon – new guidelines

We have previously reported that West Hill has been the subject of a number of speculative planning applications by developers seeking to take advantage of East Devon District Council's inability to demonstrate a minimum 5-year housing land supply. In planning terms, this "tilts the balance" in favour of approval.

However, a revised National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) released in December 2023 states that where a local authority is developing an emerging Local Plan, if that emerging draft Local Plan is sufficiently progressed, it need only demonstrate a minimum 4-year housing land supply. The emerging East Devon draft Local Plan has reached the stage where it benefits from this provision and East Devon District Council can demonstrate a 4.5 year housing land supply. Therefore the "tilted balance" need not be applied.

This is certainly something that WHPC now refers to in its consultee responses.

Councillor vacancies – consider joining us!

At the time of writing, there are still two Councillor vacancies to be filled by co-option. We know there are many residents who could make a valuable contribution to our work. For more information, check the WHPC website or contact our Parish Clerk Anne Oliver for further details.

Men's Shed Ottery

Men's Shed origins are to be found, back in the late nineties, in Australian towns and cities, where it was recognised that men, especially when subject to some sort of life-changing circumstances, often cannot find the right kind of social support.



Some men live alone because their partner has died; others might be the full-time Carer for their partner but may themselves need medical, physical and emotional support. For many men, when retirement comes, it can feel that their personal identity and sense of purpose is lost. The possible resulting loneliness and

isolation can create a negative downward spiral. Bringing men together over a common interest and task, the Men's Shed concept is now one of the fastest growing community organisations in the UK.

The origins of our Men's Shed Ottery are firmly based through the interaction of Ottery Help Scheme and Age UK. In 2016, with a grant from the Norman Family Trust and the offer of a large portacabin from Ottery Town Council, the Shed began with an initial membership of about ten. A year later, with a growing membership, Men's Shed Ottery became a registered charity.

It became apparent that the portacabin wasn't big enough and a purpose-designed, self-built wooden 'shed' was envisioned but grants were difficult to find. Quite unexpectedly, local businessman Stuart Phillips generously offered what was originally the spacious rear of the old bakery in Hind Street. With enthusiasm and much work from the Shedders, they adapted their new home to its fresh purpose. Hard-won funding bought pieces of machinery and essential dust extraction - and what space! Room for a general-purpose woodworking shop and a machine shop, plus a quiet social room for those necessary refreshments.

The social side of the Shed is emphasised. It's often remarked that the main activity, under the arch of that place opposite Sainsbury's car park, is drinking tea and eating biscuits, amidst much banter. Membership has rocketed and the doors are now open four days a week, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, with Saturday - a recently instigated 'Community Shed' where membership includes women. Visitors are welcomed at Hind Street on those days between 10am and 4pm ... and a cuppa is always offered!

The Unusual Use of an Apple Cake Recipe

In our world today it is safe to assume that people can be divided into three groups: those who believe in a god; those who are undecided; and those who, in spite of good evidence, do not.

The understanding of the majority of those who do believe in a supernatural power is that, to achieve their god's approval, it is necessary for them to live out their lives as though they are signed-up to a university course. They will have to attend lectures, obey certain rules, pass various tests and, at the end of their lives, hope that they have done enough – been good enough – to pass their finals into a happy eternity. It is up to the individual to achieve the pass mark or hope that their god would drop his/her/its standards or turn a blind-eye.

There is only one "religion" which doesn't work this way and, surprisingly, there are even some of its adherents who mistakenly believe that they have to achieve a "degree".

John Lennox is Emeritus Professor of Mathematics at Oxford and he tells this story to illustrate how Christianity, being a loving, trusting relationship with God, differs from other religions.

When John was younger, he was very attracted to a wonderful girl called Sally. So strong were his feelings, which seemed to be reciprocated, that he wanted to marry her. So, he went out and bought her a present: a



Cookery Book. He gave this to Sally and told her to look at page 153 where there was a recipe for an Apple Cake. 'Thou shalt take 4oz of butter; 8oz of flour; 3 eggs..' "This is my favourite," he said, "Bake this and make all the other recipes in the book for the next forty years and, if you achieve a high-enough standard, I will marry you."

Actually, his story wasn't true. If it had been, I don't think that 56 years later he would be married to Sally and have three children and ten grandchildren. But he tells this story to illustrate the difference between God's love for us in Christianity and how other religions portray their gods.

In Christianity, God's acceptance of us is at the start - when Jesus sacrificed his life for us on the cross - not at the end, with judgement.

We are accepted when we first turn to him because of our awareness of our own imperfections and our realisation that Jesus restored us when he hung on the cross.
