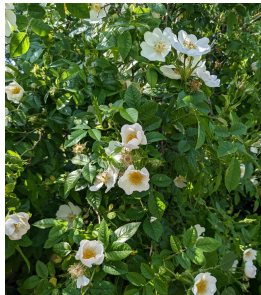

A Letter from our Team Vicar



I love this time of year when the sun is high in the sky and the days are at their longest. There is something wonderfully joyous and therapeutic about feeling the sun shining on you. It reminds me of a prayer that God gave to the Israelites over three-thousand years ago. It is a blessing that we still use today:

The Lord bless you and keep you;
the Lord make his face to shine upon you and
be gracious to you;
the Lord lift up his countenance upon you and
give you peace. [ESV]

You can find this in Numbers chapter 6.

It is a beautiful thing to pray for another person, and at its heart is that image of the Lord God's face shining upon us, an image that makes a lot of sense if you enjoy the experience of the sun shining upon you.

The same image is used again and again in the poetry of the Psalms. David wrote many of the Psalms. In number 4 he prays to the Lord, "Let the light of your face shine on us." But when he is feeling troubled in Psalm 13, he cries out in prayer, "How long will you hide your face from me?"

To have the Lord God's face to shine upon you is a great blessing; when his face is hidden, things seem much darker. It is interesting to see, then, that there are some people described in the Bible who would prefer God's face to be hidden.

In the awesome visions of the book of Revelation, John sees people who are hiding in caves and 'calling to the mountains and rocks, "Fall on us and hide us from the face of him who sits on the throne."' (chapter 6, verse 16) But why? Why would anyone want to hide from God's face?

When the sun shines, it is glorious. But it does tend to show up any dirt on the windows and the dust on the television screen. The sun exposes the grime as well as making life brighter. The Bible uses the little word 'sin' for all the things in our lives—and we all have them—that make us a bit grimy. If someone did not want to be shown their sin, they might prefer to hide from God's face. But the Gospel offers a much better way: We let his face expose the good and bad in us; we confess, knowing that Jesus died to cleanse us; we receive his forgiveness and let his face shine upon us.

May the Lord bless you and make his face to shine upon you.

Children's Crafts

Birds' Nest Craft



You will need:

2 paper plates or circles of white card
Thick card (5cm x 10cm approx.)
Wool
Yellow & brown paper
String
Scissors & hole punch
Glue/stapler
Felt pens/paints

Instructions:

Cut one of the plates/circles in half
Decorate the top half of the full circle to look like sky
Decorate the half circle to look like a nest
Glue or staple the 2 pieces of cards together

To make the pompoms:

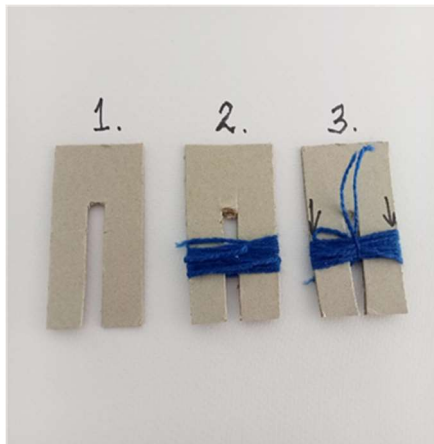
Step 1 – Cut a template out of thick card

Step 2 – Wind the wool around the template.

The more wool you use, the bigger the bird!

Step 3 – Using a small length of wool tie a knot around the middle of the wound wool. Then cut along each edge (as shown by the arrows).

Fluff out the pompom and trim to shape



Next:

Stick the pompom birds into the nest, add some yellow paper beaks and paper eyes.

Cut up some brown paper for 'nesting material'.

Punch a hole at the top and thread through some string.

Your indoor birds' nest is now ready to hang up!

The Men's Shed

My name is Dave Holland. I retired from the Police in May 2020, having served 22 years in Mid and East Devon and latterly Exeter. Before the police I had 10 years working in road transport, maintenance and engineering and prior to that I was in the Army.

I met Peter Graddon at "Steamers" a cafe and racing simulator establishment in Cullompton. Luckily it was one of their theme days: sports cars through the years. Some of the old machines there were fantastic, my wife spotted a V12 E type Jaguar! Peter suggested I could pursue my new hobby of woodworking at Men's Shed: his passion was woodturning.



I plucked up the courage to visit the shed on a Saturday morning in June 2023 and Tony Pugh told me what it was all about. They provide a repair, and in some cases full manufacture, of commissions from local groups and members of the public. Anything is considered. They have members with many skills, woodworking, metal work, electrical work, model making and restoration to name a few. I signed up!

A week or two later I had my first full session. I was teamed up with Mike, one of the committee members, for the day. Mike has a civil engineering background and is very skilled with his hands. I have assisted Mike with a couple of commissions, planters, a table and a woodworking bench, each one built from scratch. I picked up so much from Mike over the next few weeks, it was brilliant.

Everyone I have met at the shed has been welcoming and engaging, always including me in a project. I have also, over several months, been trained in how to use various machine tools and hand tools.

All that is expected from a member is to join in, be willing, be supportive and very importantly have fun and a laugh.

Being supportive and understanding has been very important for me, that is towards me from the members. In May 2022 I began to suffer some very strange motor function symptoms. Within a year I was diagnosed with Parkinson's. I was completely taken by surprise, shocked and more than a little worried. Joining the Men's shed has helped me immensely.

Living through Trouble

Preparing for Cafe Church in May on the story of Joseph, I was struck by the many everyday people in the Bible, whose lives were filled with one trouble after another.

We often look at the stories (especially when we read them to our children or grandchildren) from the angle of their adventures and successes,

- Joseph becoming a great ruler in Egypt
- Moses leading the people out of slavery
- David overcoming a threatening giant
- Jonah surviving being swallowed by a whale
- Daniel being rescued from a den of lions
- The apostle Paul escaping from Damascus in a laundry basket

to name just a few.

But do we look behind the scenes of the lives of these people, or the lives of the prophets whose personal stories we hear less often? Do we view them as people like ourselves, and look at what they endured?

Do we ask ourselves how we would have coped? And do we look for the golden thread running through these stories and our own?

That thread is summed up by Joseph himself, who told his brothers *"You thought this for evil, but God thought it for good."* This was not to say that God approved what Joseph's brothers did, (Genesis 37) rather that He transformed the outcome to bring good out of it: the saving of many lives.

In the New Testament Jesus tells his disciples: *"In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world."* And Paul writes: *"we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to (his) purpose."*

Is this just for a chosen few? What is His purpose? His purpose is that all mankind should be restored to relationship with Him. The saving of many lives. Those who love Him are those who have already responded to His love and put their trust in Him for every situation. They are the ones who can testify to this truth.

A verse known by many is Jeremiah 29:11 - *"For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, says the LORD, thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you a future and a hope."* Jeremiah proclaims this word from God to the people of Israel just before they are overwhelmed, in stages taking nearly 20 years, by Nebuchadnezzar's armies and gradually all taken into captivity in Babylon. In context, it comes immediately after a reassurance that after 70 years God would bring them back home: a prophecy which was fulfilled in an amazing way through a powerful pagan ruler. So what does this mean for us today?

To quote a Psalm which many love, it is this: *“Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; For You [are] with me; Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me”* (in other words: strengthen me).

In all these stories the golden thread is that God is walking beside those who trust Him, through thick and thin. He walks beside us as One who Himself knew what it meant to be vulnerable, because He too went through trials greater than any of ours. It doesn't mean we will be spared trouble or sickness or grief, but that God will be there alongside us and we can know that however hard, however gut-wrenching, it may feel at the time, He **will** transform it and we **will** one day be able to see just how He has brought more good than we could ask or imagine.

This is my faith. This is my testimony.

Councillor's Column

Potters/Morrisons planning application



In light of the significant level of objection to the Potters Country Market planning application, I had thought that the owners might withdraw their application and revise their plans. Instead, they have 'doubled down' and submitted a lengthy 'rebuttal' letter outlining why they consider their application to be policy compliant. As far as I am concerned, the newly submitted rebuttal letter does not overcome the strong grounds for refusing the application, and I am pressing EDDC to formally refuse the application.

Local Plan – green wedges

EDDC will imminently be consulting on a number of further matters relating to the Local Plan. You will recall that EDDC previously consulted on the draft plan including site allocations in December 2022. The most relevant matter for West Hill residents in the forthcoming consultation is the 'green wedge' between West Hill and Ottery St Mary which had been adopted in the West Hill and Ottery St Mary Neighbourhood Plan. It protects the open space between the two communities and makes development on it more difficult. This green wedge (and many others across the district) is under threat from development and I would urge as many people as possible to respond to the consultation in support of maintaining it.

Devon County Council – Combined County Authority

Devon County Council has voted to establish a Combined County Authority (CCA) with Torbay Council. I did not vote in support of this because I am concerned it will result in yet more bureaucracy and cannot see what

tangible improvement it is going to deliver for the lives of Devon residents. I also think it is intrinsically undemocratic for Torbay Council with a population of 139,000 to have three seats on the CCA, when DCC with a population of 953,000 also only has three seats.

Tipton School – relocation

There is currently a public consultation running until the 19th June on the potential relocation of Tipton school to a site at Thorne Farm, Ottery. Whilst this primarily impacts the village of Tipton it is also relevant for families within West Hill whose children attend Tipton School. Whilst I recognise the long standing and serious impacts of flood risk on the lower school site in Tipton I do believe that the school should remain in Tipton. Two potential sites have been identified within Tipton and in my view every effort should be made to overcome barriers associated with those sites, rather than simply moving to Ottery. Full details of the consultation can be found both on Tipton School's website and Devon County Council's website.

Hospiscare News

Funding update..

In the last edition, we mentioned about fair funding for Hospiscare. We are continuing this lobby and we still urge you to write to Dr Sarah Wollaston and Bill Shields, Chair and CEO of the ICB, to ask them to fund Hospiscare fairly so we can continue to provide outstanding-rated care to local patients and families living with terminal illnesses.

Due to a £2.5 million funding deficit, we have sadly been forced to cut back our vital services from April 2024. This includes reducing bed numbers on our ward in Exeter from 12 to 8 and reducing our weekend community nursing service.

As an independent local charity, it costs close to £10 million each year to provide our services - 82% of which the hospice raises itself with the help of local people.

Our local community is already so generous. We can't keep asking local people for more money to fund our healthcare - but our costs have increased greatly in the last 12 months.

Only 18% of our funding comes from the government – compared to an average of 37% nationwide. For two years, we've have been actively lobbying for an increase in our funding to this average level, but it hasn't happened - and now we've had no choice but to reduce our services - which isn't fair to the people of Devon.

Although we can't change a terminal diagnosis, we want to continue to be there, ensuring that those with life-limiting illnesses receive expert palliative and end-of-life care at no cost to them, their family or loved ones. We want to be there for the friends and families of our patients, providing the support and advice they need. But as a local charity, we are reliant on donations and gifts in wills to fund our services.

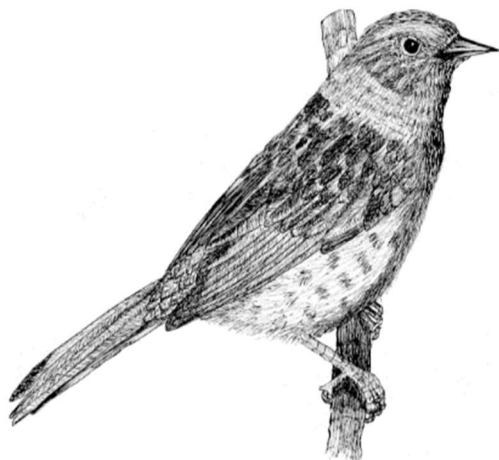

The Birds of West Hill

The Dunnock is a familiar garden bird, formerly known as the Hedge Sparrow. In fact, the bird is not closely related to the sparrows and formal name was changed in 1923. Over 45 local names have been recorded including hedge creeper; hedge jug; hedge pick; and hedge warbler. Predictably it is a bird seen in hedges. The names hegesugge and shufflewing derive from hege for hedge and sugge for flutterer, a correct observation of the bird's habit of fluttering its wings, especially when breeding. It also acquired human names such as isaac, molly and philip. The name Dunnock is based on dun- meaning dull brown/grey colour (which is accurate) and -ock, a suffix meaning small. Its scientific name is *Prunella modularis* with *prunella* referring to the bird's brown colour and *modularis* meaning to sing. The Dunnock has a loud, persistent, scratchy song.

The Dunnock is promiscuous, with many females mating with many males, typically living in groups of up to 3 females and 3 males. An avian hippy! Dunnocks have found this form of relationship (polygyandrous) to be the most successful way to maximise breeding success. How mistaken was the Victorian clergy who advocated that his congregation follow the example of the Dunnock "Unobtrusive, quiet and retiring ... the Dunnock exhibits a pattern which many of a higher grade might imitate..."!!

The bird is the most common host for the Cuckoo's egg hence

the name blind dunnock, i.e. it does not see the Cuckoo laying an egg in its nest.

Interestingly the Cuckoo's egg does not mimic the Dunnock's blue egg colouration, as it does for its other host species. Shakespeare referred to the bird in King Lear - "The hedge sparrow fed the cuckoo so long, that it had its head bit off by its young".

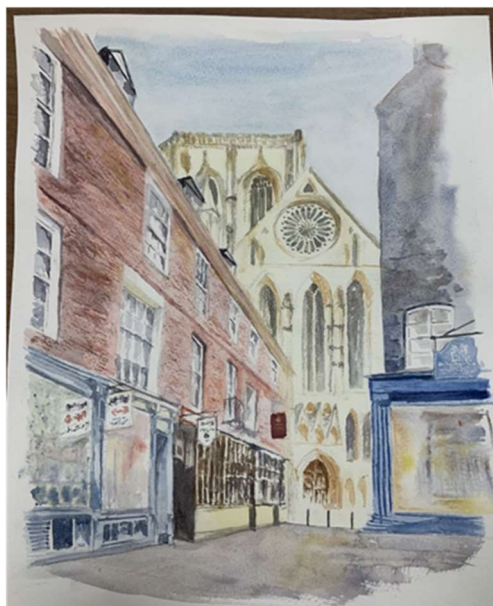
West Hill Art Group

Perspective is complicated but vital to give accuracy and 3D to paintings. The main concept is to find your eye level as this creates the eye line. If you are viewing the sea, or any horizon, that automatically becomes the eye line.

Once this is decided, any horizontal parts on the building or street, such as window or door frames or roof lines above that eye line will go **DOWN** to join that line at a vanishing point. Any horizontal lines below that line on buildings, pavements and roads go **UP** to meet the eye line at the vanishing point. This is simple one-point perspective leading to a vanishing point. Buildings sit better in a painting if the perspective is believable.

Our finished paintings depicted different places, many of them of special interest to the individual. Each member has a distinctive style and it is interesting to watch these develop. Some use pen and ink as well as watercolour.

Our next project will be the beautiful scenery around West Hill and other parts of East Devon.
