### A Letter from our Team Vicar



Like many people, I love the long, light evenings of the late Spring and early Summer. If you do too, you will know that this is a difficult time of year. By the end of August the evenings are noticeably shorter, and the change accelerates through September. Even so, as October begins we still have some really bright days. My birthday is early October, and over the years I have had many beautiful sunny birthdays. But then we get to the end of October and

the clocks change. In an instant we are plunged into properly dark evenings.

One of God's key characteristics is that he is light. Most people have heard of The Gospel according to John. What you may not know is that the New Testament also includes three letters written by John. The second and third are very short personal letters from John to individual friends. The first letter is longer, although still the little brother to the much longer and more famous gospel. This first letter of John includes this verse:

God is light; in him there is no darkness at all. [1 John 1:5b NIV] In a wonderful piece of alliteration—in English at least—three major characteristics of God are Life, Love and Light. And in our English Bibles God's name in the Old Testament is translated 'the LORD', and in the New Testament Jesus is called 'Lord'. So we have:

the Lord of Life and Love and Light.

These are three things that he is; they are also three things that he gives. He gives us life; he gives us love; he gives us light. And as we go along day by day, we can choose to receive these three things from him. We can choose to receive his life; we can choose to be loved by him and to love him; we can choose to walk in the light.


This is why, on the last day of October—a day that has become associated with dark things—at St Michael's Church we choose light. All Hallows Day is another name for All Saints Day, a day celebrating people who are full of God's life, love and light. What better then, on All Hallows Eve—a.k.a. Hallow-e'en, to have a Lite Nite (details on the next page).

I hope that you might come along. But whether or not you can come, I invite you to step into the Lord's light.

### St Michael's Church Project: NACRE



**NACRE** is the acronym chosen by St Michael's to identify its project for the **N**arthex **And Church RE**-visioning. A plan for renewal. The work, which has been approved by the church authorities, will transform the area into a more welcoming space, which can be used by the whole community. It will involve new LED lighting throughout.

The Narthex (church hall) will be insulated and double-glazed windows upgraded together with new flooring and chairs.

#### Give To Go Green

These changes obviously come at a cost, some of which can be raised through grants, especially for the energy-saving aspects of the project such as the LED lights, insulation and double-glazed windows. The Church of England's 'Give To Go Green' initiative will



match any monies raised, up to a maximum of £10,000, during a set 6-weeks period.

#### St Michael's Goes Green

The good news is that St Michael's has successfully applied to be part of this initiative. Our fundraising period will be from 20<sup>th</sup> September to 31<sup>st</sup> October. By the time you read this, the first event, a Family Barn Dance, will have taken place at RBL. This will be followed by:

**Friday 27<sup>th</sup> to Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> September** – St Michael's will hold **A Flower Festival for Harvest**. Entry is free, but donations will be appreciated. Refreshments will be served from 10am to 3.30pm on Friday and Saturday. At the Friday **Welcome Café**, there will also be New2U and Willow Craft stalls. A **Harvest Lunch** is planned from midday after the Sunday service. All welcome.

On Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> September, Music in a Quiet Place (7pm-9pm) at St Michael's will offer an evening of classical music by Joel Munday, a young international violinist accompanied by pianist, Alex Wilson. Tickets £10 including interval drinks. Children have free entry, but this event is recommended for over 12 years only.



**Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> October** (7pm-9pm) at St Michael's, sees the **Sing Out Community Singers** treating us to an evening of contemporary songs.

### **Inspirational Hymns**

Music and singing are a vital part of our lives. Both convey messages, meaning and emotion far better than mere words can. When we sing hymns, songs and the liturgy in church we are able, through music and singing, to express so much more about God, faith and our lives. Music and singing add so much to our everyday lives. In this occasional series of articles I'd like to re-tell the story of how specific hymns came to be written. Authors tell the Christian message, offer praise to God and relate different aspects of faith through words and music to such great effect. When we sing these hymns we engage at a very deep and meaningful spiritual level.

This edition's hymn is an American, Victorian hymn that has such a powerful back story – 'When peace like a river attendeth my way', written by Horatio Spafford. Spafford, born in 1828, was a wealthy Chicago businessman and an active evangelical Christian. He was married with 4 daughters. In 1871 a serious fire destroyed all his business premises, and he lost all his wealth. In 1873 he planned a trip to England and Europe. His wife Anna and their 4 daughters went ahead. Whilst at sea their ship was involved in a collision and all 4 daughters were drowned, but Anna survived.

A little time later Horatio set sail for Liverpool, to join his wife. During the sailing the captain stopped the ship mid-ocean and called Horatio to the bridge, to tell him that they were over the spot where his daughters had drowned. It was here that he had the inspiration to write his well-known hymn. The words of the first verse are "When peace like a river attendeth my way, when sorrows like sea billows roll. Whatever my lot thou hast taught me to know, it is well with my soul, it is well with my soul." After such a tragedy he was able to take solace and comfort from his deep faith in God. He finished the hymn in 1876.

Tragedy struck again. In 1875 the Spafford's son died, aged 3. In 1881 Horatio and Anna moved to Jerusalem and spent their time in charitable work. Horatio died in 1888, but Anna continued her charitable work, including setting up a children's hospital and helping wounded soldiers in WW1. Anna died in 1923.

YouTube has many versions of the hymn plus a superb narration of this story by Hugh Bonneville.

When peace like a river attendeth my way, when sorrows like sea billows roll. Whatever my lot thou hast taught me to know, it is well with my soul, it is well with my soul.

Though Satan should buffet, though trials should come, let this blest assurance control, that Christ hath regarded my helpless estate and hath shed his own blood for my soul.

For me be it Christ, be it Christ hence to live! If Jordan above me shall roll,

No pang shall be mine, for in death as in life, thou wilt whisper thy peace to my soul.

But Lord, 'tis for thee, for thy coming we wait, the sky not the grave, is our goal; oh, trump of the angel! O voice of the Lord! Blessed hope! Blessed rest of my soul.

### **Season of Creation**

The theme for Season of Creation 2024 is 'hope and act with creation'. In Romans 8, Paul writes "<sup>22</sup> For we know that all creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time".

As people of faith, the state of our world should grieve us. In the UK we live in one of the most nature depleted countries on earth, and currently the decline continues. Across the world extreme weather is increasing frequency and intensity. The Climate Crisis isn't a future issue, it's here now.

But there is reason to hope. In 2015 the emissions gap report predicted warming of over 4°C with the policies of the time. Since then, progress has been made, the 2023 report now predicts (if current policies remain) that we are expecting around 3°C. It's not good enough but it shows that change is possible.

Recently I met the Archbishop of Melanesia. He shared powerfully that Melanesian communities don't need reminding of the climate crisis, they are living with the effects daily. In our privileged world we don't feel the effects as often. We need reminding; we need to remember that as one of the world's wealthiest nations we are responsible for the effects our consumerism has had and is having on some of the poorest people in the world.

In Matthew 25 Jesus says, "I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, <sup>43</sup> I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.' <sup>44</sup> "They also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?' <sup>45</sup> "He will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.' When we see record breaking storms, sea level rises, drought and desertification do we stop and think, Jesus is there. Do we stop and ask, in what small way have we contributed to this chaos?

We can do better; we are called to do better. The faithful servant was told "You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things." Let's start by being faithful with what we have.

Let's act together in hope for creation.

For anyone new to the locality, Ottery Help Scheme serves the communities covered by The Coleridge Medical Centre. Our remit is to offer a wide range of services to support residents whether it be transport to and from a medical appointment or joining one of the groups such as Friendship Group, Memory Cafe, Seated Exercise, Music Group, Board Games Group and some occasional creative workshops. We have access to the League of Friends minibus, so wellbeing trips are a regular feature and recently a group thoroughly enjoyed a trip to the theatre. Other support is available through the Home Help service, a monthly free legal advice clinic with a local solicitor and befriending face to face or over the phone.

In order that all these activities can take place we are always eager to recruit new volunteers to support activities, as well as drivers to enable us to take approx. 110 journeys a week to medical appointments.

Being a volunteer is not an onerous task: it's for you to do as much or as little as you choose. Drivers are invited to share with the office a week in advance their availability for the following week, all are reimbursed their fuel expenses.

Our Chief Officer chairs the Ottery and District Health Matters group. At a recent meeting with representatives from the Coleridge Medical Centre it was agreed we would hold an event on Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> November in the surgery to inform residents about practice changes, the many professionals now based at the surgery and the different routes to access all your health needs which may not necessitate an appointment with your GP.



### The Birds of West Hill

Whilst walking alongside the River Otter you may well have noticed several small birds flitting around, twisting and turning in the air. These birds look like Swallows but lack tail streamers and are a light brown colour. If you have, then you have spotted Sand Martin. The river is attractive as the sandy banks provide an ideal location for nesting and there is plenty of their aerial fly food above the water. The birds nest colonially in holes in sandy banks that can be up to 1 m in length, excavating about 10 cm a day. Parents can pick out the distinctive call of their own young in a noisy colony. At Seaton Wetlands reserve an artificial bank has been constructed where Sand Martins are now breeding successfully (alongside bats!). The birds were initially attracted to the site by playing the Sand Martin's call.

Sand Martins are summer migrants. A tale taken seriously at one time was that in winter the birds hibernated under mud and revived in spring. Birds gather in huge flocks in the autumn, migrating to Spain and then down the African coast to Senegal.



Birds return to the UK in spring by a more easterly route over the Sahara and north through Italy, returning to the exact same breeding location. A marvelous feat of avian navigation (without Google Maps!).

Martin in the bird's name is from the Norman man's name of Martin, associated with the god of war, Mars. Local names for the Sand Martin include bank swallow, an apt name; bitter bank, meaning bite the bank, as in nest making; land swallow; pit martin; sandy swallow and witchuck.

### **West Hill Parish Council**

We all know that West Hill is a lovely place to live so we should not be surprised that there is a continuing stream of planning applications to build new properties in this area. This may well increase in the coming months as Councils are faced with new, increased targets for house building set by the Government. In East Devon the District Council may have to find space for up to 28% more houses than previously planned, which will be a huge challenge. I am sure that we all appreciate that people need houses to live in, but sustainable communities need more than just houses. There also has

to be proper provision for schools, medical and dental services, recreation facilities, public transport and shops amongst other things so your Parish Council is constantly trying to protect the sustainability of our community whilst recognising that people need somewhere to live. We know that the facilities in West Hill are very stretched already so we anticipate some difficult times ahead on the planning front.

As a part of the long term planning process East Devon District Council is working to produce an updated Local Plan. WHPC was invited to participate in one of the Working Group sessions so we could have our say in the process and we await to see the proposed new plan when it goes out for consultation in the near future.

One of our Parish Council objectives for this year is to develop an Emergency Plan for West Hill. I am delighted that a number of residents have joined our working group to help develop this plan and I am very grateful to them for the time and effort that they have devoted to this project.

Those who are regular visitors to the playpark may have noticed that some new benches have been installed to replace the old ones that were well past their sell-by date. This is a first step in a developing programme to upgrade the play park equipment and make sure that we can maintain everything to keep users safe and also provide for the needs of different ages in the park.

We are moving closer to the construction of the long proposed public footpath between West Hill Road and the Village Hall and School. The legal terms of the lease agreement between The Village Hall trustees and West Hill Parish Council have been agreed, contractors and specialist advisers have been selected and we are nearly ready to start work. One final hurdle is an agreement with the Council Highways Department about painting some safety markings on West Hill Road. This is an extraordinarily bureaucratic process, but we are working our way through it and are very keen to set a date for construction to begin.

On a final and very personal note, my wife and I have just passed the milestone of having lived in West Hill for 1 year. When we moved in our very first visitors delivered a copy of The Messenger and a wonderful Welcome Pack. Apart from being very informative and useful it also sent us a strong message that West Hill is, as I remarked in my opening paragraph, a lovely place to live. It is not just the environment but also the people who make it so and long may that continue.

### Living Life to the Full

Jesus, speaking of Himself as a shepherd of a flock, said: "I am come that they might have life: and have it to the full". So, in these times, when much around us may seem dark, uncertain and sometimes quite insane, what is it that Jesus offers? Just a study of the word 'life' in John's gospel is a good start to answering that question. But, currently attempting to translate the book of Deuteronomy from the original Hebrew, I have been struck by the common sense of some of the Old Testament teaching which gives guidelines for life.

The food laws initially seem quite random, and difficult to understand, but when explained by the late Chief Rabbi, Jonathan Sacks, suddenly become clearer. He explains them in the context of God's conversation with Job. "Where were you, when ....". And suddenly it all falls into place:- not everything was made for man; something perhaps we are now beginning to understand afresh as we look at conservation, going "green" and caring for creation.

And the laws about lending and giving. How bizarre to be told that when you lend something to a member of your wider family, that in the seventh year you should write off the debt. And that if you are considering giving a loan in the sixth year, not to think twice about it just because the seventh year is near. Surely that thought would be human nature? But no, God says, if you have been blessed by God, then you will be blessed by blessing others with the same generosity with which God has blessed you. In all this and much more there is the underlying principle of generosity.

Jesus came not to replace God's law or to do away with it, but to fulfil it. "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you.", he taught. And that applies not just to the giving but the thought process behind it. Never give grudgingly or counting the cost, but give freely and joyfully of time, talents and possessions, and in giving this way know that God will bless you.

Jesus' teaching was underpinned by the supreme picture of selfless giving, seen in His birth, life, death, resurrection, ascension into heaven and sending of His Holy Spirit. As St Paul wrote, "Thanks be to God for His indescribable gift".



### **Councillor's Column**



I'm writing at the start of September. There is a whole series of East Devon District Council meetings coming up this month to discuss housing allocations for the local plan. The pressure to deliver houses is greater than ever due to the new government's housing targets. EDDC is trying to deliver its local plan under transitional arrangements which would mean delivering 946 houses per year (already a very high number) rather than new incoming government figures which would see this figure uplifted by 28%. This new figure is just impossible. Whether EDDC can

rely on the transitional arrangements or will be forced to accept a 28% uplift will depend on the exact timing of the publication of the new National Planning Policy Framework, which is not yet known. If EDDC can publish its final version of the draft local plan within one month of the publication of the new NPPF then EDDC will be able to rely on the transitional arrangements.

Our district has massively over-delivered housing over the past decade when compared with the national average, but the infrastructure has really fallen behind. One of the things that concerns me is whether East Devon District Council and Devon County Council have been ensuring that developers have been making all the contributions to services they should have been and that the councils have been allocating the money in an appropriate way.

That's why I am raising a formal question at Devon County Council about their annual Infrastructure statements which don't appear on the website, and I have asked whether Devon residents are missing out as a result. I'm also urging East Devon District Council to actually allocate the estimated £10 million it has collected from developers, which remains on its bank account but unspent.

I also think it's very important that new buildings support wildlife and in particular address the decline of species. The swift population for example has rapidly declined, falling by almost 60% in the last thirty years. It is estimated that there will be fewer than 40,000 pairs of swifts remaining in the UK by 2025. One of the biggest causes of decline of swifts is the lack of nest sites. I have tabled a notice of motion calling for Devon County Council to urge the government to make swift bricks mandatory in all new houses.

In other planning news, I have no update to share about the Potters site since the planning application was withdrawn earlier this year. However, it may be the case that the owner/developer is working behind the scenes on a revised scheme.

Finally, I hope that community groups will bear in mind that as the Devon County Councillor for the Otter Valley I have a Locality Budget that enables me to make grants. Please see all the details on DCC's website for the terms of the grant scheme.

### **OSM Hospital League of Friends**

It has been an exciting year for the Friends with completion of the urology investigation unit and the relocation of the clinical measurement service to Ottery. This marks a great new chapter in how our local hospital is being used to deliver care to local people.

OSM Hospital is busier than it has ever been, typically almost 500 people are seen each week. One additional benefit is that patients are now able to have investigations, discussion with medical and nursing teams and definitive treatment all in a single appointment. One patient had the equivalent of 6 separate visits combined. This saves time, uncertainty, worry (and parking spaces). Feedback has been extremely positive. Due to the vision of the local clinical leaders and managers we now have a service of national reputation which is being used as an example for others to follow.

We hosted an open afternoon in November 2023 - celebrating the developments and showing how busy the hospital is with its new services, procedure areas and clinic rooms. The Friends also had the privilege of being invited to the formal opening in April. Since these events many have said they would appreciate another chance to look around.

We are pleased to continue supporting Liz, our Admiral dementia nurse, and have recently reached a three-way funding agreement together with RDUH and Dementia UK to secure her role for another 2 years. We've given grants to Hospiscare, the minibus service through Ottery Help Scheme, education bursaries, music therapy sessions, hospital furnishing improvements and equipment purchases to reduce hair loss resulting from cancer treatments.

All our activities come at a cost, and over the last couple of years we have given out far more in grants than we have brought in by donations, so we are exploring new ways to raise funds.
